#ChaleWote2014 street art festival

The Chale Wote street art festival in historic James Town showcases the best in art, film, culture and music. Ghanaian artists delighted enthusiasts with their revolutionary approaches while others travelled back to yesteryear to relive the times with vintage precision. The ChaleWote street art festival is a privately organised exhibition that seeks to expose aspiring local artists as well as showcase professional work from renowned artists.

Bike riders and skaters performed extraordinary heart-stopping stunts while the popular and sensational highlife band, *Wulomei*, excited the crowd with their fresh, indigenous tunes. Several art installations were dotted along the streets as well as murals with a healthy dose of surrealist imagination to challenge intellectual art lovers and critics. Old Fadama Slum book drive

Volunteers at our Human Rights office in Accra launched a fundraiser online to provide books for the children in Ghana's biggest slum – Old Fadama. Old Fadama is home to many illegal settlers who are predominantly from northern Ghana. They are under constant threat of eviction by city authorities and their children lack access to a good education.

University College Dublin - second group of veterinary students

The second batch of veterinary students from the University College of Dublin arrived in Kumasi to gain firsthand experience in animal care and veterinary medicine. They observed and assisted with the treatment of animals in Amakom and Catenna veterinary clinics. Furthermore, the volunteers reached out to communities and provided free treatment, rabies vaccinations and open castrations for dogs and cats. They made field visits to goat and pig farms to also offer their veterinary care.

The Dunshaughlin group from Ireland


